



DESIGN FOR A TOY MONEY-BOX.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Design No. 12,848, dated April 4, 1882.

Application filed February 13, 1882. Term of patent 31 years.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that we, Louis Kyser and Alfred C. Rex, both of the city and county of Philadelphia, and State of Pennsylvania, have invented an Improvement in Designs for Toy Money-Boxes, of which the following is a specification.

Our invention relates to designs for toy money-boxes; and it consists in forming the 10 box of two parts bolted together, one half representing the front of a house and the other the back, the said front being provided with the representation of a door, windows, and a scroll with the word "Bank" lettered thereon, and the back being provided with windows; further, in surmounting the body of the box, which is substantially rectangular in crosssection, with a peaked roof, carrying at its ridge a cupola having the representation of a clock 20 on front and back, the said cupola also being provided with a peaked roof; and in minor details, all of which are fully set forth in the following specification and shown in the ac-

The object of this invention is a new and improved design for toy money-boxes.

companying drawings.

In the drawings, Figure 1 is a front elevation of our improved design for toy moneybox. Fig. 2 is a back elevation of same; and 30 Fig. 3 is a perspective view of same, showing

method of arranging the two parts.

The box is made of two halves, X and Y, and is held together by a bolt, K, the head of which forms an ornamentation. The body A in front is provided with a door, F, having a Compatition to a compatition of the body A. Corinthian top, supported on posts, and having the year in which they are made marked thereon. On either side of the door are Gothic windows H, having open work in them, and 40 above the windows are star projections or depressions I, and above the door is a scroll, J,

with the word "Bank" marked thereon. Below the door are steps G, and around the base of the body is an ornamental casting, M. The body A in back is provided with three or more 45 windows, H; above them open work or apertures L, as shown. The body is made to represent stone-work or masonry. the body is the peaked roof B, made to represent slate or tile, carrying on top a rectan- 50 gular or other shaped cupola, D, having clockfaces C marked thereon, and said cupola is surmounted by a peaked roof, E. The two halves X and Y meet on the sides of the box, and are made so as to leave an aperture, N, in 55 the roof when put together.

Having now described our invention, what we claim as new, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is-

1. The design for a toy money-box, which 60 consists of a rectangular body provided with windows and door, and carrying a peaked roof surmounted with a cupola having the repre-

sentation of the face of a clock marked thereon, substantially as described.

2. The design for a toy money-box, which consists of the body A, provided in front with the representation of a door, F, windows H, and scroll J, having the word "Bank" marked thereon, and on the back with windows H, the 70 said body carrying a peaked roof, B, surmounted with a cupola, D, having the representation of a clock, C, and a peaked roof, E, substantially as and for the purpose specified.
